

Ipswich Novotel announcement—our response

The government announced recently it would be ceasing to use a number of hotels to accommodate asylum seekers. The Novotel in Ipswich is among these, and the asylum seekers living there will be moved out in the coming weeks. We expect most people to be transferred to other Home Office asylum accommodation, but there is still a lot of uncertainty and we are seeing people at our office every day worried about what happens next. Many have made community links here, are involved in volunteering or studying, or have ongoing health treatment needs. Some people have been informed at short notice that they are being moved to other parts of the country they don't know at all. We are supporting people through this process, which can be highly impersonal, liaising with health professionals, providing vital travel items and referral letters, and giving as much reassurance as possible. We are also very grateful to the Sanctuary Day Centre in Ipswich that has provided so much valuable support to people at the Novotel over the past six months, and which closed recently.

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Community events and activities

So much of our time is spent trying to meet people's urgent needs and support them through bureaucratic and uncaring processes. Many of our clients find themselves in limbo, unable to move on with their lives and dealing with uncertainty, anxiety and separation from loved ones. Therefore, it's increasingly important that we make the space for community events, group trips and activities and the chance for people to escape their day-to-day worries and share their experiences and interests. In recent weeks we have organised a sports day for asylum-seeking families (complete with egg and

spoon race!); we visited Flatford with a group of women thanks to the Dedham Vale AONB, including Flatford Mill, East Bergholt Church and the RSPB Wildlife Garden (pictured top right); and we had a wonderful Iranian food day where some of the talented cooks we work with were able to share their cuisine and culinary skills with other asylum-seeking families (pictured right). Thank you to Copdock and Washbrook Village Hall and to everyone whose support makes such a difference.

We held our 24th AGM recently (pictured right) to reflect on our work over the busiest year we have seen and hear the inspirational stories of some of the people we work with. It was a packed house and amazing to feel so much support and compassion for refugees and asylum seekers. And of course the food, all made by local refugees and asylum seekers, was delicious! In particular, we highlighted some of the employment success

stories we have been a part of over the past year. We heard from Ali, who is thriving in his role with a local housing association, Anastasiia, who lives in Lowestoft and secured an apprenticeship with an energy company, and Lazarus (pictured right), a talented athlete and asylum seeker who we supported to gain a volunteer placement and who recently completed the Ipswich Half Marathon in 1:29:57, coming 57th out of 1300 finishers! Among the food highlights were the cinnamon buns made by Ammar, a Syrian master baker whose fabulous sourdough bread is available from Your Local on St Matthew's St in Ipswich—get a taste of his skills <u>here</u>!





Suffolk Refugee Support Annual Report

We published our 2022-23 Annual Report recently, which we hope does justice to the scale and impact of our work during our busiest ever year. The report is full of case studies, quotes and useful information across all our services—<u>read it in full here</u>.

- We provided direct support to 1503 people from 49 countries (143% increase on previous year)
- We saw 1000 people new to our services (many of them new to the UK)
- We supported 300+ refugee and asylum-seeking children
- 150 people improved their English language skills through our ESOL classes
- 112 people secured employment with our support
